



Cohort 2012 (N=4,368)** 4-Year vs 5-Year Graduation Rate

With an additional year, the graduation rate for students who entered high school as freshmen in 2008 (the 2012 Cohort) increased 6.4 percentage points, from 65.9% (4-year graduation rate) to 72.3% (5-year graduation rate). The increase represents an additional 278 members of the 2012 cohort graduating from the BPS after an extra year in school.





For the 7th consecutive year, the district's 5-year graduation rate continued to rise. The 5-year graduation rate for the 2012 cohort increased by 1.4 percentage points compared to the 2011 cohort, and is the highest ever.

Detailed statistics for the 4-year versus 5-year graduation rate by student status for cohort 2012 can be found in Appendix A. Appendix B presents the 5-year graduation rate by student subgroup for Cohorts 2006 through 2012.


Cohort 2012 (N=4,368)** 4-Year vs 5-Year Graduation Rate By Race/Ethnicity



- All racial/ethnic groups for cohort 2012 had higher 5-year rates compared to their 4-year rates. The additional year seems most beneficial to African American and Hispanic students, with each group seeing a 7-point and 7.2 point increase respectively (128 African American and 100 Hispanic students) in their 5-year graduation rates compared to the 4-year rates; White students experienced a gain of 5.1 points (31 students); and Asian students gained 3.1 points (13 students).
- While gaps in the graduation rates among racial/ethnic groups remain, the additional year did narrow the difference between Black and White students from 8.7 percentage points at the end of four years to 6.8 percentage points after five years, and reduce the margin between Hispanic and White students from 14.4 percentage points at the end of four years to 12.3 percentage points after five years.

- An additional year in high school benefited both male and female students: the 5-year graduation rate for males in the 2012 cohort increased by 7.8 percentage points compared to the 4-year rate. Similarly, female students saw a 4.8 point increase in their graduation rate with the additional year.
- Of the 952 English language learner (ELL) students who were part of the 2012 cohort, 565 students (59.3%) graduated in 4 years. An additional 82 ELL students graduated after staying in school an extra year, resulting in the 68.0% 5-year graduation rate. The 5-year rate for students with disabilities was 50.4% (or 66 additional students graduating); and for low-income students, the 5-year rate was 6.9 points higher than the 4-year rate, with 258 additional students graduating.
- Of all student groups, ELL students benefited the most with an additional year in high school: their 5-year graduation rate was up 8.7 percentage points, higher than any other group compared to the 4-year rate.

- With an additional year in high school, the percentage of students who graduated increased for all schools that met the sample size requirement. Boston International High had the largest increase, 20.3 percentage points, from 48.6% (4-year graduation rate) to 68.9% (5-year graduation rate).
- In 2014, the 5-Year graduation rate target for both state and federal accountability purposes is 85% applied to the 2012 Cohort. Based on the 5-year rate, 11 high schools have met this requirement. However, only Boston Green Academy and West Roxbury Academy would benefit from the 5-year rate because the other 9 schools have also met the 2014 4-year rate target of 80%.
