



Allotments (Guardrail 3)

- School Plan investments: 50%
- Regional School Innovation: 10%
- Strategic District-wide investments: 30%
 This includes centrally-deployed resources to ensure equity across schools.
- Community Partnership investments: 10%

Recovery supports for all with a focus on our most marginalized students

Started with a total allocation estimate (\$50M) A base per pupil amount ensures all students receive some support

Additional funding for students we believe have been disproportionately harmed by the pandemic:

- Students receiving special education services
- Students receiving English learner supports
- Students experiencing Poverty

All Students	50,544	\$434	\$21,946,729
Special Education	10,251	\$434	\$4,451,091
English Learners	15,328	\$434	\$6,655,577
Low Income	39,029	\$434	\$16,946,603

What this looks like when we run this allocation model with our current schools

	Total	Per Pupil	
	Allocation	Allocation	
Minimum	\$98,118	\$580	
Maximum	\$1,437,650	\$1,272	
Median	\$395,452	\$1,038	

The biggest factor driving total allocation is school size; larger schools will get more money than smaller schools

The biggest factor driving the per pupil allocation is the demographics of the students; schools with higher percentages of high need students will have a higher per pupil allocation.


